As Senior Research Manager at the Wilder Foundation, Craig oversees a research unit focusing on data driven projects, which provide information on an array of topics relating to community well-being - including things like homelessness, poverty and the aging population.

Craig joined Wilder Research in 2001 after working as a program evaluator for Minnesota's Office of the Legislative Auditor. Prior to that Craig worked as a project director for a survey research center, and in the social services with children, developmentally disabled adults, and people experiencing homelessness.

Craig is a Minnesota native but his post-secondary education took place in Iowa (Luther College) and the University of Oregon (master's in Community and Regional Planning; doctorate in Sociology). He has taught university-level seminars on quantitative research methods and homelessness, has spoken at several local and national conferences, and currently serves on the board of the Community Indicators Consortium.

This should be a timely topic considering our post-election state!

AAUW HASTINGS BRANCH – GENERAL MEETING MINUTES October 24, 2016

PRESIDENT - Lisa West. Lisa called the meeting to order at 7:03 p.m. She mentioned that she had been "Up North" closing her family cabin. This activity got her thinking about time, specifically, the passing of it. That the AAUW General Meeting is taking place on October 24th elicited more memories. Twenty six years ago today, Lisa began working for Dakota County. Twenty five years ago, also on this date, Lisa's daughter Mariah was born. Lisa recalled being nervous about informing her manager about the pregnancy. The department she worked in was thinly staffed and some huge projects were underway. Lisa was happy to report that her manager had been very supportive, both of the pregnancy of and the need for work life balance. Lisa has such a sense of gratitude for the support that she has received and suggested that the membership reflect on the many things we each have to be grateful for. Lisa then introduced Pat Giddings who was celebrating her 93rd birthday. Pat noted that the really big news of the day was that she was able to renew her driver's license! Lisa then introduced Lew Linde. Lew noted that he had skin cancer lesions removed and was the proud owner of a brand new hip.

SECRETARY - Pam Pontzer. Pam submitted meeting minutes from the September 26, 2016 general meeting that were published in the Twig. A motion was made by Pat Schultz and seconded by Trudy Cragg to approve the September 26, 2016 general meeting minutes as printed in the Twig. The motion was unanimously approved.

TREASURER - Nancy Techam. Nancy summarized the recent revenues and expenses and noted that October had been a quiet month. Three new members have joined bringing membership up to 80 for the branch. Residual garage sale expenses were paid. The checking account balance at the end of October is \$6,520.50 A motion was made by Shirley Tammen and seconded by Mary Ellen Fox to approve the Treasurer's report. The motion was unanimously approved.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

MEMBERSHIP- Ruth Versaw and Camille Nelson. Camille stated that two new members joined at this meeting. There was one guest in attendance.

PROGRAMS- Pam Sullivan and Peggy Horsch. Peggy stated that the November program will feature Craig Helmstetter of the Wilder Foundation. Helmstetter will discuss poverty and homelessness in regards to the aging demographic in the state of Minnesota. Peggy noted that the Holiday Social will be held at the Hastings Art Center on December 19, 2016. Members will be asked to bring an appetizer, a dessert or contribute \$10.00. Finally Peggy noted that an article concerning sexual assault was featured in the October 23, 2016 Sunday Star Tribune. The article was horrifying, and women still have a long way to go in this arena.

PUBLIC POLICY - Pat Power. Pat noted that early voting is having an impact on voter participation. She also told the group that Amy Anderson, the Executive Director of Minnesota Civic Youth had recruited Hastings Elementary and Middle Schools to participate in a voting experience at each of the schools. AAUW is looking to provide volunteers to staff the voting areas in the various schools. Pat passed a clipboard for members to volunteer for this event.

GAD-ABOUTS - Cindy Toppin and Sue Cruse. Sue informed the members that on Friday, December 02, 2016, the Gad-Abouts would leave Hastings at 9:00 A.M. to attend the Annual Holiday Bazaar held at the Landmark Center in St. Paul. The sale opens at 10:00 A.M. Lunch will follow at 1:15 P.M. at the St. Paul Hotel.

BOOK CLUB - Shirley Tammen. Shirley reminded the group that the book club will be held on November 14, 2016 at the home of Ann Johnson. The book being discussed is <u>Hotel on the Corner of Bitter and Sweet.</u> The author, Jamie Ford, will be speaking at the Hastings Reads event in February. Hastings Reads is supported by AAUW through funds raised at the AAUW Book Sale.

TWIG NEWSLETTER - Lois Twedt. Lois stated that she had forwarded a notice to the membership concerning volunteer opportunities at Hastings Area Schools for the Kids Vote effort sponsored by Minnesota Civic Youth.

AAUW FUNDS - Glenda Schnirring. Glenda informed the membership that the board will decide what funds our branch will contribute to at the upcoming board meeting. Glenda will report back to the membership at the November General Meeting. Glenda noted that 230 women were able to attend higher education through AAUW funding.

NCCWSL - Gail Glashan, Pat Powers, Ann Skoglund, Jan Junkman. Gail presented a NCCWSL video to the group. Registration for the event opens in January. The conference will take place May 31 to June 3, 2017. Membership should be on the lookout for possible candidates for the NCCWSL event. AAUW Minnesota provides 11 scholarships. The AAUW State portion is \$500, and our branch contributes \$350. These funds cover room, board, flight and registration for the candidate.

COMMUNITY - Margaret Goderstad. Margaret noted that on October 29th and 30th, candle lit tours would be offered at the LeDuc Mansion. On November 4, the HPAAC Gala will be held at SEAS gathering space from 6:00 P.M. to 9:30 P.M.. Finally, on November 6, the Hastings Artists Show will open at the LeDuc. Verna Fuller informed the group that the Regina Auxiliary will hold it Fall Fundraising sale on Sunday, October 30th from 11A.M. to 4 P.M. Funds raised at the event support a myriad of activities and acquisitions that benefit the local hospital and senior living facility. Also, on November 4, the movie "Chosen" will be shown at the United Methodist Church. The film highlights human trafficking.

GARAGE SALE - Kathy O'Keefe and Linda Bindman - Kathy noted that the garage sale is now in a state of hibernation.

SCHOOL SUPPLY PROJECT - Cathy Sery and Mary Ellen Olson. Cathy noted that 301 students were supplied by this year's drive. Hastings Family Service thanked all who donated and volunteered.

AAUW Board Approves AAUW Funds Designation

AAUW Funds is the name of the national organization's funding instrument to which the Hastings Branch donates every November. The amount of \$1000 is budgeted every year for this purpose. It was moved and approved that the \$1000 be divided evenly between two Funds. The Minnesota Past Presidents American Fellowship Fund and the unrestricted AAUW Fund will both receive \$500 for their respective objectives. The latter fund supports research, graduate education, and launches programs which help women break through barriers in education and the workplace.

When members individually respond to AAUW mailings requesting donations, those donations are tax-deductible and are used for AAUW's all-encompassing mission. Last year our members gave a total of \$750 individually which was credited to the Hastings Branch. Greeting cards and other offers from AAUW are all fund-raising efforts to support its programs. It is very advantageous to the Hastings Branch and the AAUW mission when you respond to such requests.

The conference will be at the University of Maryland, College Park, May 31–June 3, 2017. The scholarship recipient will receive an \$850 scholarship to fund the conference, workshops, room/board, and travel expenses. Our Hastings branch board has once again approved \$350 from our budget to fund this scholarship and will apply for a \$500 scholarship from AAUW of Minnesota. This conference is a transformative experience for attendees and prepares them to be the next generation of leaders.

The conference program includes keynote speakers, career and graduate school fairs, leadership building workshops, and Women of Distinction awards. Representatives from over 100 graduate schools and employers will be at the convention.
