





PUBLIC POLICY & the State of Minnesota

The Minnesota Office on the Economic Status of Women, which was abolished effective July 1, published a summary, based on formal listening sessions around the state, that found transportation, affordable housing, affordable child care, and earning enough to make a livable wage are the most important problems facing Minnesota women. LEGAL ADVOCACY FUND



The case, *Rizo v. Fresno County Office of Education*, brought by Aileen Rizo, who spoke at the 2016 MN State Convention in Duluth, raises the issue of whether employers can base pay exclusively on an employee's salary history if doing so results in a women being paid less than her male colleague who has less experience and less seniority. Aileen Rizo was a math consultant for the Fresno County Office of Education. She filed suit against the FCOE under equal pay

and gender discrimination laws. On April 27, 2017, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit handed down an unfavorable decision in Rizo's case. AAUW joined an amicus curiae brief in support of Rizo's petition for rehearing en banc (before all of the court's judges) to urge the Ninth Circuit to reconsider. On August 29th, the Ninth Circuit granted Rizo's petition for rehearing en banc.
