AAUW HASTINGS BRANCH - GENERAL MEETING MINUTES – May 22, 2017

The meeting was called to order at 6:45 by President Lisa West.

Lisa introduced the Hastings AAUW Board to the membership. She noted that she is President Elect of Minnesota AAUW. She is looking for someone who can develop a web page for Hastings AAUW. She asked membership to consider serving on the AAUW Hastings Board.

The Secretary's Report was approved for the May 2017 General Meeting with a motion by Pat Schultz, and seconded by Gail Glashan. The motion was unanimously approved.

The Treasurer, Mary Charlson, presented the Treasurer's reports for September, 2017. The Garage Sale netted \$3,650.10. Of that amount, \$372.00 came from the bake sale and \$485.00 from cash donations. This is a new record for our annual garage sale. We now have 80 members and our checking account balance is \$6957.29. A motion to approve the Treasurer's report was made by Jane Driscoll and seconded by Shirley Tammen. The motion was unanimously approved.

Membership Co-Chair Ruth Versaw noted that there were brochures and bookmarks on each table. We have 2 new members. Ruth then introduced the guests that were present at the meeting.

Program Past Co-Chair Peggy Horsch informed the membership about our October program. The program will be held at Hastings High School in collaboration with the Hastings High School Feminism Club. The program will address sexual assault on college campuses. Our branch received \$500 from Minnesota AAUW to sponsor this program. The lecture hall will open at 6:00 and the program will begin in the Hastings High School Auditorium at 7:00 PM on October 23, 2017.

Public Policy Chair Pat Powers reminded the group about the 2 minute activist. Some of the issues that AAUW National is following are Economic Security, Fight for Fair Pay, Increase Federal Minimum Wage, tell Congress not to repeal Affordable Care, and urge Congress to pass a budget that supports women and families, supports paid sick days and protects our health care. Gad-Abouts Co-Chair Cindy Toppin informed the group that the first activity will be a tour of the Minnesota State Capitol on October 26, 2017 at 10:00 A.M. Book Club Chair Shirley Tammen informed the members that the book group will meet on October 9, 2017 at the home of Ann Johnson. The book is "Hidden Figures".

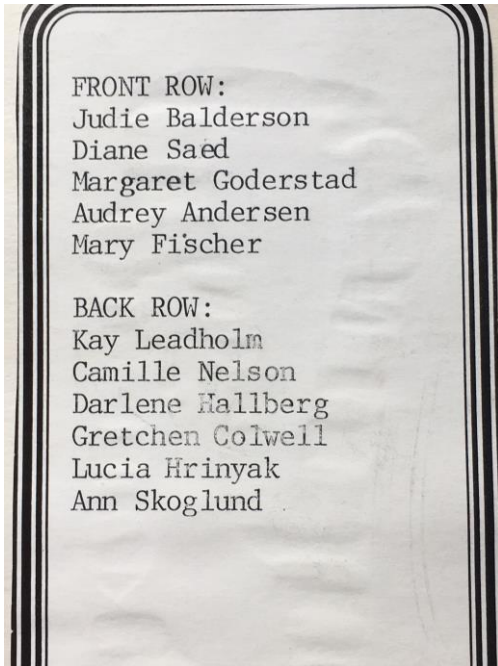
