MESSAGE FROM OUR CO-PRESIDENTS ANDREA AND LINDA

Greetings AAUW Ely Branch Members,

As this is our last newsletter for our fiscal year, we decided to look back at what we've done this past year. We're thrilled that our branch has been able to accomplish so much!

Because of the generosity of our members and the fundraising efforts of Kay Vandervort along with branch member contributions, we are able to grant almost \$9,000 in scholarships to support women and girls' education:

- MN North College-Ely Campus
- National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL)
- Northwoods Young Writers Camp
- STARBASE STEM Youth Camp

Our Public Policy Committee has been busy this year with several events. The Dolly Parton Pub Crawl last fall (developed by three of our younger branch members Carly Wogen, Lucy Soderstrom, and Anna Heil) was so much fun! And with a fabulous turnout of the Ely community, it was a great way to educate the public on the pay inequities between women and men using a fact-filled "passport" for each participant.

Another Public Policy initiative this year was to provide the community with information on human trafficking. We hosted a powerful program on sexual assault and trafficking last September provided by the Executive Director of Sexual Assault Program for North St. Louis County. At a Tuesday Group last October, we hosted a compelling presentation, Human Trafficking and Exploitation in Minnesota, by a federal contractor with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Office-Trafficking in Persons and the

Executive Director of the Program for Aid to Victims of Sexual Violence (PAVSA). This June, we will be sponsoring a book signing event for a young woman who was a victim of sex trafficking. She is a courageous woman who is willing to tell her story and now lives in the area.

Last August, our branch sponsored a one-woman performance of the life of Jeanette Rankin who, in 1916, was the first woman elected to Congress and was a champion of women's rights and civil rights throughout her life.

In February, Public Policy hosted a lunch for about 80 kids, mostly of Native American heritage, attending Indigenous Students Day at the Ely Film Festival where the kids watched impactful films about Indigenous culture and experiences.

All these Public Policy events were coordinated by our branch, and funding was in partnership with Ely EMPOWER.

Getting the long-overdue Equal Rights Amendment into the Minnesota State Constitution is still an important priority for our branch. Eight branch members traveled to the Minnesota State Capitol in February for the ERA rally -- and news footage of some of our members was on at least two channels! Numerous emails and calls to state legislators were also sent from our members.

And the semiannual Adopt-a-Highway cleanup for our two-mile stretch of Highway 169 is always enjoyable! The next one is coming up on Friday, May 10, with additional information in this newsletter.

Next fiscal year looks just as active!

Our end-of-year banquet/branch meeting is Tuesday, May 14, at 5:30 pm at the GEL. As in previous years, we'll have a fabulous silent auction and bucket raffle to raise money for scholarships and our programs. There will be plenty of time to visit with other members and decide which tempting silent auction/raffle items you want - baked goods, wine baskets, a gardening basket, etc. We will also pay tribute to our three new AAUW Named Grant Honorees. This is always a fun meeting! Hope to see you there.

On April 26 and 27, eight Ely Branch members traveled to Hastings for the first in-person Minnesota Annual Meeting since 2022. We enjoyed spending time with committed women from around the state, listening to inspirational speakers and learning about the status of legislation and issues that impact the women and girls that our mission supports.

The speakers included Suzann Willhite, ERA MN President Emeritus, who provided a

status report on the Equal Rights Amendment in the state legislature and how members can continue to lobby our legislators. We learned about legal issues affecting people of diverse racial and gender identities and the struggle for reproductive freedom. And we learned so much more in an action-packed weekend.

A late surprise was the addition of Lt. Governor Peggy Flanagan to the Saturday agenda. Her personal story and commitment to equality for all was truly moving and impactful to the audience. Along with recorded messages from Senator Amy Klobuchar and Second District Congresswoman Angie Craig, we felt fortunate to live in a state where our issues are supported by other strong women.

We heard from outgoing AAUW MN State President, Jan Carey, and had a chance to visit with Kelsey Waits, the incoming President. We are very fortunate to have these women representing Minnesota to the National AAUW organization. Kelsey even bid on and won our beautiful Ely Silent Auction basket and plans to visit us this summer!

All in all, it was an amazing weekend, reminding us that women can accomplish a great deal when we work together as friends with a mission.

MEMBER UPDATES

MEET DI WHITE!

I was born in Lincoln, Nebraska and, except for a few years as a child when my father's job took us to nearby communities, I lived all my life in Lincoln. I found Lincoln politically to be a breath of fresh air compared to the rest of the state.

I did not attend my graduation at the University of Nebraska because it was the same day I married my first husband. While we were on our honeymoon, I was offered a teaching position at Irving Junior High. In my 34 years at Irving, I taught the English curriculum to 7th, 8th, and 9th graders. Remedial reading and advanced reading were also among my assignments. I was teaching creative writing when computers first came to our building in the early '80s. I was the first teacher in the district to employ a simple word-processing application called Bank-Street Writer in a creative writing class. This set me on the path to becoming the primary computer teacher at Irving. I taught Computer Applications, Multi-Media, and also after-school classes for other teachers.

When publication applications became available on the computer, I became the Journalism teacher for both newspaper and yearbook. The last six years of my teaching career were at a specialty school for information technology where I taught video-making, 3-D animation, and music creation. In 2005, I became certified in "Career and Technology Education" by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards, which gave me certification to teach in this field in all 50 states.

My husband and I raised and showed Afghan Hounds for the first five years of our marriage, but had to give that up when children arrived. We raised two beautiful daughters who have become strong, independent women with charming personalities. During this busy time I completed my Masters in Adult and Continuing Education. I also became aware of Title IX and realized that I could participate in competitive sports. I started with running and soon transitioned to triathlons. Biking is still my favorite of the 3 sports. I rode Tour de Nebraska (a five-day ride) 22 times, and RAGBRAI (a seven-day ride) 10 times.

My husband died from cancer after 36 years of marriage. I met my current husband, Rusty, on a Tour de Nebraska ride and married him in 2008. We've been on 30-plus BWCAW trips together, and this is what prompted us to look for a cabin in the Ely area.

We bought our cabin on White Iron Lake in 2020, believing that we would commute from Lincoln. Seven hundred miles is a long commute for two old people, and we love the people of Ely, so Ely has become our home.
