AAUW applauds this effort, but many challenges are expected. Our branch will continue to focus on making the ERA a reality.

Remember that our February meeting will feature a book discussion of "My Antonia," by Willa Cather. Our own member, Jan Guerin, will lead the discussion. Jan has taught English Literature and Film Studies and Communications at the high school and college levels. Everyone is welcome to attend, even if you haven't read the book. The discussion is guaranteed to be very interesting.

There are so many of you who have been involved for many years and have served the branch as officers, board members and leaders of committees. PUBLIC POLICY

AAUW is modifying the Public Policy Priorities. We are reprinting them here in the newsletter to assure all of you see them. AAUW MN uses these priorities to define the state priorities, and in turn, your Public Policy Committee uses both the national and the state priorities to formulate our project priorities. Our current study period to understand and support community needs and services for local women's economic security. The focus on inclusion and support for LGBTQ+

individuals is a topic we will submit as a resolution at the AAUW MN annual meeting. Adopted resolutions require each branch to implement activities supporting the resolution. The following is from the AAUW website:

The AAUW Public Policy Committee and Board of Directors recommend the following changes to the Public Policy Priorities.

The proposed principles continue to emphasize core values regarding education, economic security and social justice. The proposal removes issues that, while valuable and important components to equity, go beyond the scope of AAUW's focus on higher education and were so broad as to not provide guidance on the types of policy approaches that would be in line with AAUW's mission.

The proposed policy priorities for federal advocacy focus on equity in higher education and are chosen based on critical need, political viability, and potential for distinctive AAUW contribution or leadership.

Below is a summary of proposed changes for 2025-2027:

- Specific endorsement of the 2024 Title IX regulations which provide increased support for student survivors of sexual harassment and assault and clarify Title IX protections for students who are LGBTQ+, pregnant, or parenting.
- Clear articulation of support for inclusion of LGBTQ+ individuals in policies around school and workplace protections.
- Emphasis on specific components important for women's economic security including education, pay equity, caregiving burdens, retirement safety nets, and access to contraception and abortion.
- Recognition that the Equal Rights Amendment has met the constitutional requirements for ratification as articulated in the U.S. Constitution.
- Removal of broad statements about poverty reduction, housing, health care for all, gun violence, immigration, and campaign finance reform.
- Clear articulation that AAUW's public policy focus is domestic.

This document is intended to outline the overarching core values guiding AAUW's policy work to provide flexibility at the federal, state, and local level. It is not intended to be an exhaustive list of specific

issues critical to ensure equity for all.

SAY HELLO TO JUDY KLUN!

Judy Klun (O'Brien) was born in Chicago, Illinois, into a close-knit family of five. Her father worked as a building engineer at the University of Chicago, while her mother dedicated herself to raising Judy and her siblings.

Judy's athletic prowess was evident from an early age, and she excelled in basketball, tennis, and track at Harold L. Richards High School in Oak Lawn Illinois. Once TItle IX became a law, Judy and two friends went to the athletic director to request that the girls be allowed to participate in sports. Permission was granted, and the first girls track team was formed. They took 3rd place in state. Their achievements earned them a place in the Harold L Richards Hall of Fame.

After high school, Judy pursued her passion for education at Winona State University by obtaining a BS degree in Physical Education, and later, a Health Education degree at UWS. With her degree in hand in 1978, Judy returned to Chicago, teaching at Thornton High School, making significant contributions to the school's basketball

program. She was chosen coach of the year by her colleagues.

In a life-changing move, Judy relocated to Ely, Minnesota, where she met and married attorney Larry Klun. Together, they raised four children: Kelly, Lauren, Barbara, and Tom. Judy dedicated thirty -six years to the Ely School District, teaching Physical Education, Health, and later, Technology. Her commitment to education led her to earn a Master's Degree in Media and Technology from the College of Saint Scholastica in 1999.

Judy's remarkable career in education spanned nearly 40 years, culminating in her retirement from Ely Public Schools in 2016. Her legacy continues to inspire students and educators alike.
