MESSAGE FROM OUR CO-PRESIDENTS ANDREA AND LINDA

Once again, summer is winding down, fall is definitely in the air and it's just about time for our first branch meeting of the 2025-26 season. We really look forward to seeing our friends again on Tuesday, September 9 and welcoming our thirteen (!) new members to the branch. We've tried to capture a few highlights since we were last together.

The annual Garden Party in July was a smashing success – Kay will report more on that front, but we want to extend a huge thank you to Barb Soderberg (and Kurt too, of course) and as always Kay Vandervort for her considerable work in pulling it all together with the assistance of an enthusiastic committee.

We are so pleased this year to have been able to provide almost \$8,000 in scholarships. The college scholarships included our first-ever Woman in the Trades scholarship, the non-traditional MN North scholarship and sponsoring a young college student to the National Conference for Collegiate Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) in Washington, DC. In addition, we sent two young high school girls to the Northwoods Writing Camp on Atsokan Island on Rainy Lake and three 5th grade girls to STARBASE Stem camp in Duluth. The recipients have all expressed their gratitude and reported excellent experiences.

We had the opportunity to work with the Ely State Theater to show the movie *Lilly*. The 2024 film depicts the life of Lilly Ledbetter as she battles the court case, Ledbetter v. Goodyear Tire & Door Rubber Co. We were fortunate to be able to provide the Ely community the opportunity to learn more about this amazing woman who inspired the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2009. AAUW National was instrumental in supporting the passage of this important law that helped bring transparency to the workplace and was an integral step on the continuing path toward gender pay equity. Thanks to the many members (and especially Fredrica Musgrave who was at the theater every day) who greeted attendees and provided information about pay equity and the work of our branch.

An exciting note for the upcoming year is that our Ely branch will celebrate its 100th anniversary in 2026. We'll celebrate this milestone together at our May meeting. A number of members will be needed to plan a meaningful tribute to the branch. It should be a good chance to learn more about the early days and the women who started it all and the issues that mattered to them at that time.

On the subject of "looking for" people, several new board members are needed for the 2026-27 season. Those positions include a President/Co Presidents, a Finance Officer and a Membership VP. Please give some thought to serving in one of these capacities, even if you're currently quite new to the branch. It's a good chance to make a difference, promote the good work we do in the community and make great new friends!

Robinson was deeply influenced by the transcendentalists and their collective belief that truth and spiritual insight can be found in nature. We will use the role of nature in the novel and how it influences the characters as a springboard for our discussion. Past discussions have been engaging and lively, and Robinson's dense but beautiful novel will be a great addition to our past (and hopefully future) discussions.
